

Rural Generalist college enrolment

Rural Generalist trainees are required to complete Fellowship of the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners - Rural Generalist (FRACGP-RG) or the Australian College Rural Remote Medicine (ACRRM).

This guide assists trainees to find application and training option information. It is recommended that trainees seek advice from their Rural Generalist Training Advisor (RGTA) before making application and throughout the process as required.

There are several pathways available for enrolment to a college:

RACGP-RG

- Government funded:
 - Australian General Practice Training (AGPT)
 - Recommend 'Rural Pathway'
 - Remote Vocational Training Scheme (RVTS)
- Self-funded:
 - Fellowship Support Program (FSP)

ACRRM

- Government funded:
 - Australian General Practice Training (AGPT)
 - Rural Generalist Training Scheme (RGTS)
 - Remote Vocational Training Scheme (RVTS)
- Self-funded:
 - Independent Pathway

What is the difference between enrolment options (government funded/self-funded), colleges and the QRGP?

We've provided some information in the [appendix](#) of this guide to illustrate how the parties involved in your general practice training fit together.

When should I apply to a college to begin training?

This is an individual decision based on many factors. It is expected that QRGP trainees will be enrolled on a primary care Fellowship pathway by PGY3. We strongly recommend enrolment prior to commencing Advanced Skills Training. This ensures the training you do will count, the curriculum requirements will be met, and you will have the educational support of your college.

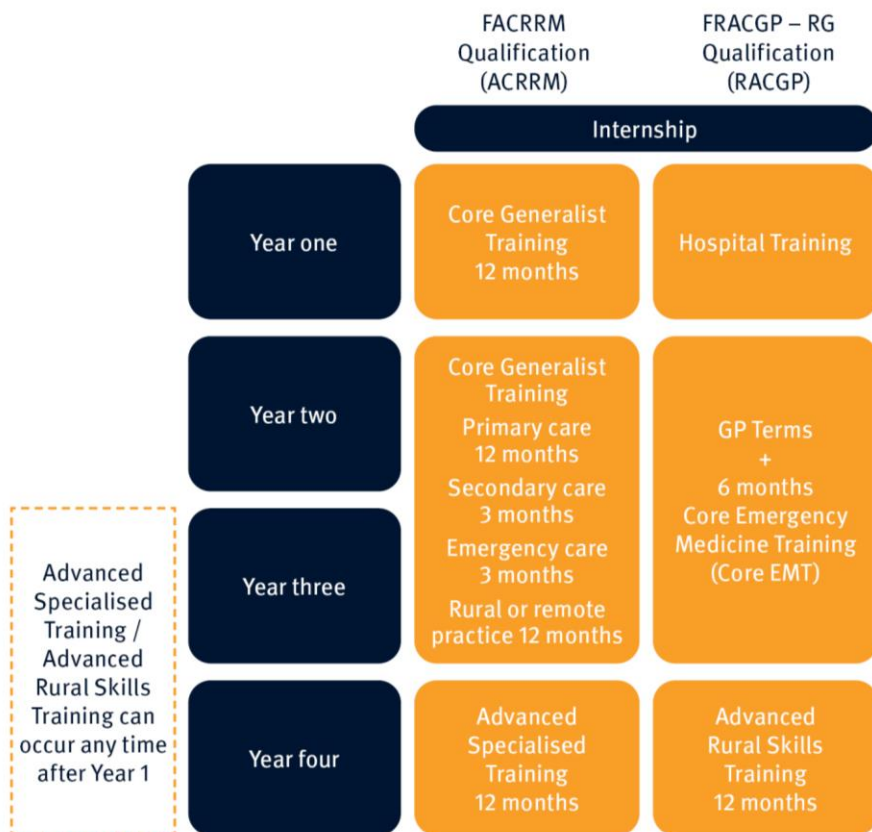
When do college applications open and how do I apply?

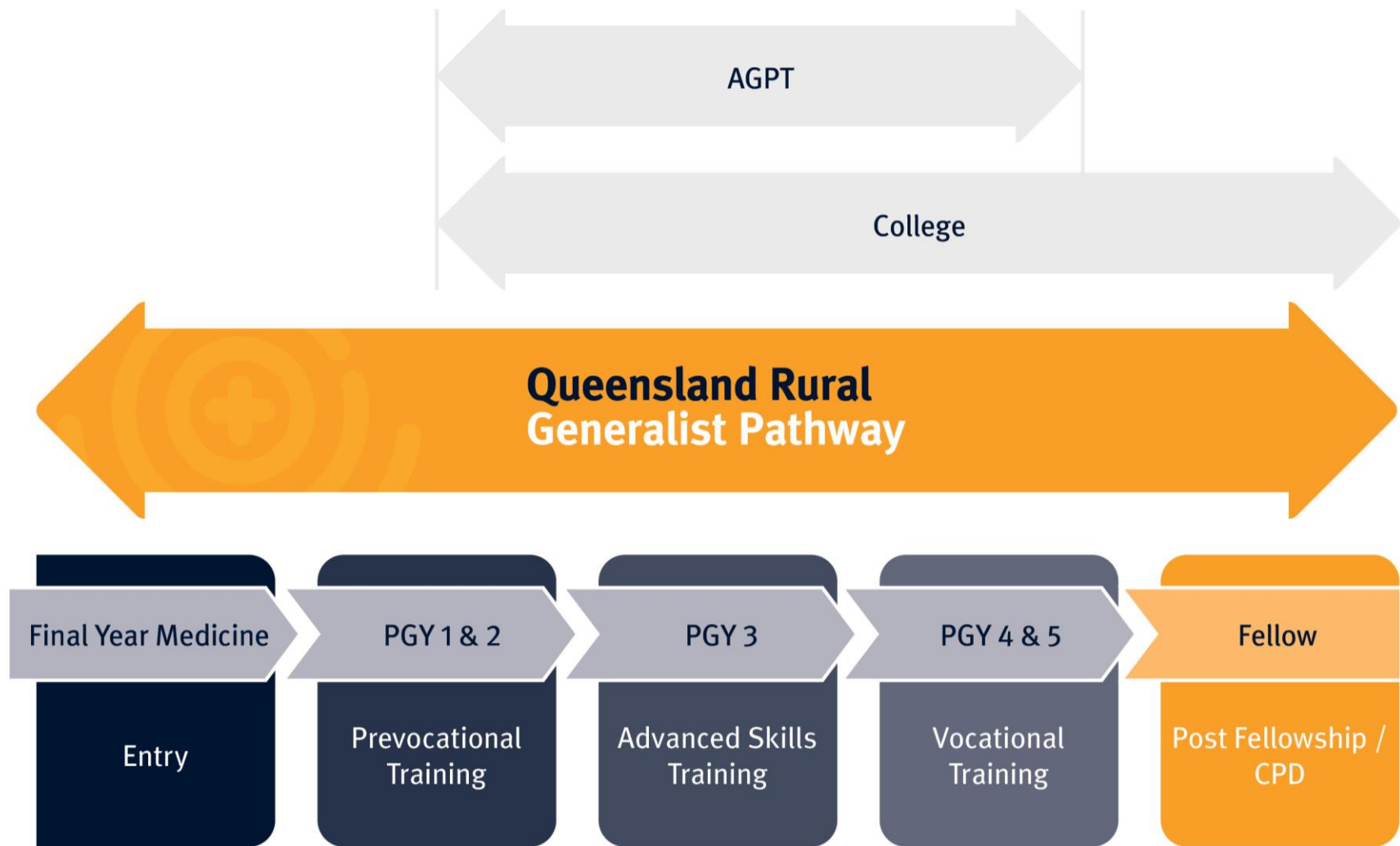
